

The Ultimate Residency Playbook

Every year, we work with many DO students that realize too late what they should have been doing in MS2/MS3 to increase their competitiveness and preparedness for the residency match. This is the unspoken checklist that residents and program directors know — but your school probably won't tell you.

Why This Happens:

- · Lack of true home programs in key (and sometimes all) specialties
 - Limits early specialty exposure, mentorship access, and research + networking opportunities.
- Insufficient infrastructure for personalized, physician-led, specialty-specific career guidance
 - Non-physician faculty = no personal insight or exposure to the nature of the application process
 - One mentor can often be staffed with 20+ students (in addition to other responsibilities)
 - Lack of key specialty specific nuances that make a successful applicant in different niches
 - Lack of emphasis on the tactical steps needed to be taken <u>early</u> in their careers to have a competitive application

The Solution: MS2

- Take both USMLE and COMLEX if competitive specialty is even remotely on your radar
- Avoid resource overload \rightarrow 1-2 Q-banks, 1-2 core video/content resources
 - Our favorites: UWorld, Amboss, Boards&Beyond, Anki
 - Use these early in MS2 to get familiar with board examination format and style
- Start building CV early: research, leadership, teaching involvement
 - Focus on quality, impact, & longevity of experience > quantity of experiences
 - Aim for experiences in specialty of interest or for causes you deeply care to support.
- Network with faculty + join interest groups (local and national)

- Do not be shy to leverage cold email outreach to faculty at other institutions some of the best relationships stem from this!
- OMM Bootcamp → comprehensive high-yield video review resource for COMLEX I/II

For the MS3:

- Prep smart for shelves/rotations: complete all questions from two (2!) Q-banks for every rotation prior to shelf exam/COMAT to ensure success.
- Be the rotation rockstar: professionalism, teamwork, ownership of patients, and assistance with daily workflow and tasks.
 - If you make your resident's life easier, they will vouch for you behind closed doors.
- Lock down LORs early and often (3-4 per specialty)
 - Identify faculty that you've worked with for at least 1-2 weeks to get non-generic and powerful evaluations.
- Finalize specialty choice by mid-MS3
 - Seek out opportunities to explore the specialties you are interested in early in the year,
 even if you are not necessarily scheduled on that specific service.
- Use VSLO strategically: identify programs early, contact coordinators in the winter to express interest in coming to rotate in Summer/Fall. Leverage any resident/attending mentor you have to vouch for you to come for an away rotation/sub-internship at their program.

Mentorship: The 3 Levels Everyone Needs - identify and build rapport with ASAP

- <u>Near-Peer (MS4)</u>: most relatable, are living through the interview/match cycle (but lack the "other side of the curtain" insight)
- <u>Resident</u>: actually evaluates students + sits on interview side, approachable, understand the system from both sides.
- Attending: harder to access and develop relationship with initially, but important for LOR + overall career trajectory guidance.

The Bottom Line

Matching your top choice residency isn't just about test scores. It's about stacking the right boxes early so that when MS4 comes, you're already positioned to win.
